TOGETHER FOR THE ENVIRONMENT





Heart of our whānau

Our loyal volunteers once again deserve a shout out for their contribution to the mahi of our organisation. We truly appreciate the effort and richness they bring, and what they are doing to give back to the community. From digging in at planting days and stream clean ups, to becoming a zero waste guru by helping sort recycling at our Resource Recovery Depot, the energy and effort they contribute makes all the difference for the achievements in this report.

Local climate action

The Whau Climate Action Network unites locals, organisations, and businesses to support low-carbon activities, with backing from the Whau Local Board. This year, it supported eight climate action events, including outreach at the Whau Chinese New Year celebrations and Matariki Whau Kapa Haka Festival, along with practical workshops on mending clothes and harvesting rainwater.

Partnership with iwi

We have also forged and strengthened connections with Te Kawerau ā Maki and feel honoured to enjoy a special relationship with this iwi. This year, we signed a memorandum of understanding with Te Kawerau ā Maki. It acknowledges the importance of our ongoing connection and how we will continue to build on this with mutual respect and open communication.

Kai for community

EcoMatters is a founding member of Kai West, which started seven years ago to bring together community organisations committed to providing local access to healthy, affordable and culturally appropriate food. Kai West has run forums and events, and piloted schemes such as a fresh food market and kai villages. The collective is now partnering with WEAVE – Working Together, to further its work in the local regenerative food system.

Collaborative climate action

EcoMatters alongside twelve other like minded community organisations form the steering committee that supports the TMCCAN – Tamaki Makaurau Community Climate Action Network, to pool knowledge and resources around community climate action initiatives. The Community Climate Action Network was established this year with support from Auckland Council so members can share best practice and scale up their grassroots efforts in tackling climate change at a local level.

Compost connections

We dug in alongside other composting enthusiasts to support the Tāmaki Makaurau Composters' Network, a regional arm of the Aotearoa Composters Network, which brings together organisations and individuals who support communities, businesses and households and institutions to compost.





HIGHLIGHTS

EcoFest

A standout in our calendar was EcoFest. held each autumn to celebrate our unique environment and sustainable living which we have organised in West Auckland for more than a decade. This was the second year we collaborated with our fellow Auckland eco hubs to promote a regionwide festival. In the west alone, we supported 80 events, and another 48 in Maungakiekie-Tāmaki and central Auckland, contributing to a total of 350 workshops, experiences and activities across Tāmaki Makaurau. Thank you to the Henderson-Massey, Waitākere Ranges and Whau local boards and The Trusts Community Foundation for their long-standing support of the festival.





Diverse workshops

Our workshop programme was vibrant and diverse, offering hands-on learning across various sustainability and environmental themes. We covered everything from mending and felt-making to understanding the Maramataka, the traditional Māori lunar calendar, as a guide for gardening and planting.

Themed workshops

Festivals such as Matariki and the Auckland Climate Festival were opportunities to host themed workshops, and we created our own special days, such as the Vintage Kids Day, featuring wooden games, craft workshops and more. Plastic Free July was another anchor for creative workshops, like turning washing machine parts into a worm farm. Our Bicycle Part Fence workshop engaged participants in sustainable action while also replacing an ageing fence with some quite literal upcycling.

Shoreline Adaptation Plan

In a new project this year, people from teams across our organisation worked together to help Tāmaki Makaurau residents plan collectively for the effects of climate disruption. In partnership with Auckland Council, we empowered locals to have a say in how coastal assets like parks, roads, wharves, and paths should be managed in response to the growing risks of flooding and erosion.

We connected with community networks, and hosted town hall meetings and popup stalls at markets and community events, to let people know about the Shoreline Adaptation Plan process underway for their area. The outreach and events were an opportunity for people to ask questions, share what they love about their coastline and give feedback on the proposed management strategies.





Expanding our store range

This year, we expanded our EcoMatters Store product range, offering more unique, locally crafted, sustainable, and reusable items, including Remix recycled plastic earrings, White Cloud natural skincare, Vinty handmade fabric toys, Rebs Leafy Lens cards, and Graham's wood turned spoons and bowls. We're seeing growing demand for Solid toothpaste refills and Stainless steel razors, reducing plastic waste in the process. Successful promotions in local magazines have brought new customers into the store, and we've taken our offerings on the road to markets and libraries, sharing our eco-friendly products with even more people.

MEASURES OF SUCCESS



Understanding what we've achieved is an important part of ensuring we're continuing to head in the right direction. Every step forward means a better outcome for both people and the planet. Ngā mihi nui to everyone who has contributed to the achievements in this report.





Local solutions to improve kai resilience remain a driving force for our Food team. An innovative partnership with the Rosebank Business Association saw the launch of Second Bite Composting, which aims to become a social enterprise offering businesses the opportunity to contribute in a meaningful way to food growing in their neighbourhood.

HIGHLIGHTS

Second Bite Composting

The initiative has been launched with support from Lotteries funding, and Auckland Council's Waste Minimisation Innovation Fund. We have several local businesses on board already and this year more than 20 tonnes of food scraps have been collected. Rather than going to landfill, these food scraps are helping nourish the soil and grow more kai in community and school gardens.

Teaching gardens

Our two teaching gardens have continued to flourish, thanks to expert guidance from our food team and amazing mahi from volunteers. At the New Lynn Organic Teaching Garden, new additions including terraced garden beds and more fencing crafted from bamboo.






Hope Teaching Garden

At Hope Teaching Garden, a new container was installed, which gave us better facilities for storing equipment and hosting visitors. A particular highlight has been the growing connections made with local schools, giving more students experience in composting, waste management and gardening.

Love Food Hate Waste workshops

Our network of experienced tutors have also been helping equip people with the skills to reduce food waste, with 48 Love Food Hate Waste workshops delivered this year. At these workshops, people learn practical cooking and food preservation techniques.

WasteMINZ Awards

We were proud to win Best Research or Advocacy Project at the 2024 WasteMINZ Awards, alongside Auckland Council and other community groups, for this public engagement campaign. We talked to hundreds of people about the food scraps service, and supported local events and conversations to happen through grants and a bin ambassador programme. The experience we gained helped us secure similar work to educate residents in target areas about how to recycle right, through a targeted door-knocking campaign.





Zero waste support grants

We supported 24 free community events to operate as zero waste, through grants totalling more than \$10,000, enabling access to education about best practice for waste diversion.

Compost Collective


Through the Compost Collective, which we run in partnership with Kaipātiki Project, more than 3,000 people learned more about home composting, while community composting hubs got a boost for essential equipment to the tune of more than \$6,000.


Composters network

This year also saw the formation of the Tāmaki Makaurau Composters Network, part of the Aotearoa Composters Network, to strengthen composting efforts across the country.

Sustainable Salons partnership

Beyond household waste, we continued our partnership with Sustainable Salons, processing materials such as metals, plastics and hair from more than 230 New Zealand hair, beauty and grooming businesses through this innovative recycling programme. This kept 34 tonnes of waste out of landfill.





E-waste and recyclables drop offs

Large quantities of e-waste and other recyclables were redirected from landfill through drop-offs at our EcoMatters Store. This initiative provides a sustainable alternative for items not accepted in kerbside recycling collections, helping ensure they are put to better use. We also collect curtains for Habitat for Humanity, pool toys for I Used to Be, mobile phones for the RE:Mobile programme, and empty ecostore bottles for reuse, further supporting community reuse and recycling efforts.

CONTINUING TO GROW



Once again, this year has been full of learning experiences for our team, as we continue to evolve to help us all use resources more wisely. Thanks to our partners and supporters who have helped us amplify our community impact.





This year, the wheels really started turning on the plans for a bike hub network right across Tāmaki Makaurau. Thanks to support from Auckland Transport, we opened a new hub in Pakuranga during October 2023, quickly followed by Onehunga in November 2023.

Buzzing Bike Hubs

These hubs hit their stride immediately, and alongside our three existing locations, were buzzing with activity. In February 2024, we reached a milestone of more than 2,000 visitors across all our hubs. We've very grateful to Eke Panuku, the Henderson-Massey, Maungakiekie-Tāmaki, Waitematā and Whau local boards, for supporting the operation of hubs in their communities.





Trafinz award

Our work alongside Auckland
Transport to set up community
bike hubs was recognised with the
2023 Trafinz National Sustainability
Leadership Award. It was also an
honour to share our expertise in
community biking programmes
at several national conferences.

Electric cargo van

Keeping our hubs connected was made a lot easier thanks to a grant from Meridian Energy's Community Decarbonisation Fund. This funded an electric cargo van, so we can move bikes between our hubs in a greener way.






Ebike Loan Scheme

Thanks to support from Waka Kotahi, we set up an ebike loan scheme that gave people a chance to see how a commuter or cargo ebike could fit into their lifestyle, with a free two week loan. The scheme was a hit, with word of mouth driving the majority of bookings. Establishing and running the scheme helped us build capacity in running such programmes.

Community events

We also kept the community engaged with events like the Street Art Bike Challenge and the first-ever Hub Crawl, encouraging everyone to explore their neighbourhoods by bike.

GOING THE EXTRA MILE









Our Nature team continues to forge strong connections between people and their environment. From regular volunteer sessions that inspire care for local streams to practical advice on managing pest plants, our work helps people understand they are part of nature, not separate from it.

HIGHLIGHTS

Protecting our native bush

In the Waitākere Ranges, our precious native bush benefited from the efforts of neighbouring residents who were equipped with advice and tools to tackle invasive weeds. Empowering individuals this way contributes to the wellbeing of shared natural spaces.

Weed management

In a similar vein, community weed bins and pest plant roadshows brought practical education directly to dozens of local residents, so they could identify and manage weeds in their backyards and beyond. A highlight was our first-ever moth plant hunt in the Henderson-Massey area, where participants collected thousands of pods before they could spread – including an outstanding 3,281 pods gathered by one dedicated team.





Healthy Waters

We undertook a new project in partnership with the Auckland Council Healthy Waters team, working with communities to care for their local streams which have been affected by flooding. For many involved, this has been a healing process to recover from both the physical and emotional effects of severe weather events, helping them feel more prepared and resilient for the future.

Volunteer contribution

Volunteers from schools, corporate and community groups, and individuals contributed thousands of hours to restoration projects of all shapes and sizes including our long-running involvement with Project Twin Streams in Glen Eden.

Sunnyvale planting sessions

We celebrated the milestone of eight years of work in Sunnyvale, with two special planting days that saw over 600 native plants put in the ground, extending this transformed space which is now a haven for wildlife.

Nurturing native plants

Volunteers also played a key role in nurturing thousands of native plants for streamside projects, with surplus plants sold to support our community nursery's ongoing efforts.





Love Your Neighbourhood

Little pockets of environmental goodness blossomed thanks to Love Your Neighbourhood grants. These funds helped local groups host clean ups, tackle weeds, and plant natives, fostering connections and pride in their neighborhoods.

Matariki planting with Mai FM

We ended the year on a high note with a special Matariki planting event at Olympic Park, hosted with Mai FM. The day brought the community together for live broadcasts, free kai, and a celebration of collective action for the environment.


Energy Wellbeing with Powershop and Meridian

Our energy-saving efforts extended across Tāmaki Makaurau through the Energy Wellbeing programme, available to Powershop and Meridian customers. Similar to EnergyMate, this programme provided in-home visits to create personalised energy-saving plans, helping households save money and creating benefits for our environment.

EnergyMate in West Auckland

We became the West Auckland delivery partner for the EnergyMate programme, assisting households struggling with power bills or heating their homes. During in-home visits, our sustainability advisors assessed energy use and provided tailored advice to reduce costs and consumption. Thanks to the Electricity Retailers' Association for supporting this initiative.





SCOPE TO GROW

Water and energy conservation continues to be the cornerstone of our efforts but we are also working on plans to diversify our offering further, with the ultimate goal of creating healthier, more sustainable homes for all. Thank you to our key partners for their support this year.

Healthy Homes Workshops

We also continued our Healthy Homes workshops for community groups in West Auckland, supported by local boards. These workshops help people to improve energy efficiency and keep their homes warm and dry.

A decade with Watercare

On the water-saving front, we marked more than a decade working in partnership with Watercare. There were a record number of people requesting help to manage their water use this year, indicating the programme remains relevant. Our team supported 861 households with in-home water checks. phone or email advice or through our interactive DIY water check, resulting in an estimated \$106,500 savings in water bills collectively. Notably, we achieved our goal of reaching more renters, doubling the number of rental properties visited, so more tenants could benefit from water-saving advice.

Composting provides local solution



Ngā mihi nui to all the organisations whose financial support has helped create meaningful outcomes for te taiao this year.




